Course Description:

This seminar examines issues regarding locality from the perspective of recent minimalist theory. We will consider locality in what traditionally have been called A and A-bar domains, as well as the interaction between them. The phenomena we will look at will include (but are not limited to) object shift, scrambling, passivization (focusing on double object constructions), raising, and long distance movement.
