I just recently stumbled across this very interesting digital atlas project, the Digital Atlas of Roman and Medieval Civilization. Since it does have material for eastern Europe (e.g., there is a "Vikings" category) and Byzantium, it should be of some real interest and might be very helpful in your teaching. The data are GIS-coded and then come up as overlays depending on what you choose to have the maps show. You can zoom in in the same fashion one zooms in on Google Earth or Mapquest to bring up a lot of detail. I haven't tried saving and printing yet, but one can do so; I assume the results than might be usable in a presentation for classes or other purposes.

It is the "Beta" version, but obviously one quite advanced. Michael McCormick is the Harvard Prof. who has been in charge of it.
