A recommendation, if you are looking for a resource for students and for images you might use for classroom presentations:

There are a bunch of short web pages in English, with clickable thumbnails to images of good quality, if a bit small (they would show all right in something like a Powerpoint presentation)--overview of history of Kremlin, samplings from various collections in Armory, etc. One interesting feature of the site is a technically sophisticated virtual tour through, e.g., the various rooms of the palace complex. You can pan a room, zoom in etc. This is one of the best such "tours" I have yet seen on a website in terms of its high technical quality. There is some audio in Russian that goes with it.

I write this as I am busy searching the internet for materials to use in some lectures where I am away from home and do not have access to all my visual resources I normally use. It is very encouraging to see how much one can now locate with a bit of searching to fill in gaps. And so easy then to put together digital slide presentations to integrate into lecture material...

Another site that might be of interest is "Russkaia istoriia v zerkale izobrazitel'nogo iskusstva." Images not always of satisfactor size or quality, but, if nothing else may provide ideas for possible resources. At:
