## English 207: Cyberculture Cyberartifact Analysis

## Length and Due Date

**Length**: 1,000-1,250 words

## Assignment

Examine one of the following "cyberartifacts" discussed in class:

- Artwork or documentation of a performance (one of Manovich's new media works, a selection from Orlan's Self-Hybridations, photos and/or video documenting one of Stelarc's "events")
- Chatbot program
- ❖ Film: AI, Blade Runner, or The Matrix
- Neuromancer

Your analysis should include the following information:

- 1. Description of the artifact
  - For art, list dimensions, material, and method of construction or production; for all artifacts, note year of creation
  - Short description of image/performance, program interface, or plot
  - Explanation of artifact's framing (content, layout and navigation scheme of web site that presents the artwork or houses the chatbot program; book or DVD cover image and critical testimonials; listing of DVD special features)
- 2. Analysis of the artifact's content and effects
  - What type of world does the artifact ask viewers to imagine (physical environment, existing technologies, bodily appearance, social relations, political and economic organization, etc.)?
  - What sensory, intellectual and/or emotional responses might the artifact provoke?
  - How does the artifact employ programming, interactivity, dialogue, narrative, language, visual elements, sound and/or other techniques to achieve its effects?
- 3. Argument regarding how the artifact fits into a larger cultural context
  - What is the artifact's function, and what are the social values attached to this function?
  - What ideas, beliefs, values and/or assumptions does the artifact reflect, examine or critique?
  - What historical conditions might have influenced the artifact's production?
  - What seems to be the psychological, aesthetic and/or ideological intent of the artifact?

## Guidelines

- 1. Although I have provided questions to guide your analysis of the artifact's content and your discussion of how the artifact addresses a specific cultural context, you should address the questions that best apply to your selected artifact.
- 2. You may organize your analysis into sections (for example, description, content/effects, and contextual analysis), or you may interweave description and analysis of content and effects, and your argument regarding cultural context.
- 3. Discussion of the artifact's cultural context will comprise the bulk of your analysis. Allow 100-200 words for description, 300-450 words for examination of content and effects, and 500-600 words for exploration of cultural context.
- 4. Assertions regarding the artifact's content, effects, and context should be supported by description of images, scenes or cinematic techniques; reference to plot events; summary, paraphrase or quotation of dialogue, narrative passages or chatbot transcripts; and/or screen shots or images.
- 5. Your analysis must reference pertinent articles from *The Cultural Studies Reader*. Many of the readings will help you examine your artifact's cultural context.
- 6. Do not forget the discussion that has taken place on the class posting board. You have already written about and received responses to your ideas regarding most of the listed artifacts.
- 7. Because you're submitting your analysis in electronic format, you have the opportunity to incorporate images, media, and hyperlinks. You may include these materials within a document, or you may compose a Web page. For documents, please title, paginate, type and double-space your submission, using one-inch margins. In the upper left-hand corner of the first page, include your name, the course number and the due date; this information should be single-spaced. For Web sites, include a title, contact information, and a creation date. You may use a 10 or 12 point Arial, Century Schoolbook, Garamond, or Times New Roman font.
- 8. When citing sources, use MLA format. Please include a list of works cited at the end of your analysis.
