A successful candidate will use the molecular biology approach to characterize how master regulatory transcription factors (bHLH proteins) of stomatal development direct stomatal stem cell maintenance and differentiation.

Priority will be given to a candidate with experience on qRT-PCR and ChIP assays.

This is a full-time, fixed-term appointment (up to 1 year) for WA Family Medical Leave; however, the position may be converted to regular appointment based on performance and funding availability.

A candidate must have solid background in basic molecular biology and for a postdoc, requires demonstrated research accomplishments. While previous experience in Arabidopsis/plants is not required, please note that everyone in the Torii lab are expected to grow plants and maintain transgenic/mutant lines, perform genetic analysis as well as sophisticated imaging/microscopy (e.g. confocal microscopy). A candidate must be strong in communication- and analytical skills, motivated and interested in to succeed, and able to work as a team as well as independently.
