









Decline in U.S. Crime from 1996-2014


- Age distribution: fewer 15-25 year-olds
- Economic growth (1990s)
 - Joblessness declined
 - Wages increased
- Crack markets declined
- Roe v. Wade (1973) legalizing abortion
 - Fewer crime prone born after 1974
 - Meaning fewer 20-25 year olds after 1994
- Increases in police and incarceration (deterrence)
































Second Amendment (Bill of Rights, 1791)
