Use the following to answer questions 1-16:

In the questions below, describe each sequence recursively. Include initial conditions and assume that the sequences begin with a_1 .

1. $a_n = 5^n$.

Ans: $a_n = 5a_{n-1}, a_1 = 5$.

2. The Fibonacci numbers.

Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + a_{n-2}, a_1 = a_2 = 1$.

3. 0,1,0,1,0,1,....

Ans: $a_n = a_{n-2}, a_1 = 0, a_2 = 1$.

4. $a_n = 1 + 2 + 3 + \dots + n$.

Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + n, a_1 = 1$.

5. 3,2,1,0,-1,-2,....

Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} - 1, a_1 = 3$.

6. $a_n = n!$.

Ans: $a_n = na_{n-1}, a_1 = 1$.

7. $1/2, 1/3, 1/4, 1/5, \dots$

Ans: $a_n = \frac{a_{n-1}}{1+a_{n-1}}, a_1 = 1/2$.

8. 0.1, 0.11, 0.111, 0.1111,....

Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + 1/10^n, a_1 = 0.1$.

9. $1^2, 2^2, 3^3, 4^2, \dots$

Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + 2n - 1, a_1 = 1$.

10. 1,111,11111,1111111,....

Ans: $a_n = 100a_{n-1} + 11$.

11. a_n = the number of subsets of a set of size n .

Ans: $a_n = 2 \cdot a_{n-1}, a_1 = 2$.

12. 1,101,10101,1010101,....

Ans: $a_n = 100a_{n-1} + 1, a_1 = 1$.

13. a_n = the number of bit strings of length n with an even number of 0s.
 Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + 2^{n-2}$, $a_1 = 1$.
14. a_n = the number of bit strings of length n that begin with 1.
 Ans: $a_n = 2a_{n-1}$, $a_1 = 1$.
15. a_n = the number of bit strings of length n that contain a pair of consecutive 0s.
 Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + a_{n-2} + 2^{n-2}$, $a_1 = 0$, $a_2 = 1$.
16. a_n = the number of ways to go down an n -step staircase if you go down 1, 2, or 3 steps at a time.
 Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + a_{n-2} + a_{n-3}$, $a_1 = 0$, $a_2 = 1$, $a_3 = 1$.
17. Verify that $a_n = 6$ is a solution to the recurrence relation $a_n = 4a_{n-1} - 3a_{n-2}$.
 Ans: $4 \cdot 6 - 3 \cdot 6 = 1 \cdot 6 = 6$.
18. Verify that $a_n = 3^n$ is a solution to the recurrence relation $a_n = 4a_{n-1} - 3a_{n-2}$.
 Ans: $4 \cdot 3^{n-1} - 3 \cdot 3^{n-2} = 4 \cdot 3^{n-1} - 3^{n-1} = 3 \cdot 3^{n-1} = 3^n$.
19. Verify that $a_n = 3^{n+4}$ is a solution to the recurrence relation $a_n = 4a_{n-1} - 3a_{n-2}$.
 Ans: $4 \cdot 3^{n+3} - 3 \cdot 3^{n+2} = 4 \cdot 3^{n+3} - 3^{n+3} = 3 \cdot 3^{n+3} = 3^{n+4}$.
20. Verify that $a_n = 3^n + 1$ is a solution to the recurrence relation $a_n = 4a_{n-1} - 3a_{n-2}$.
 Ans: $4(3^{n-1} + 1) - 3(3^{n-2} + 1) = 4 \cdot 3^{n-1} - 3^{n-1} + 4 - 3 = 3^{n-1}(4 - 1) + 1 = 3^n + 1$.
21. Verify that $a_n = 7 \cdot 3^n - \pi$ is a solution to the recurrence relation $a_n = 4a_{n-1} - 3a_{n-2}$.
 Ans: $4(7 \cdot 3^{n-1} - \pi) - 3(7 \cdot 3^{n-2} - \pi) = 28 \cdot 3^{n-1} - 7 \cdot 3^{n-1} - 4\pi + 3\pi = 7 \cdot 3^n - \pi$.

In the questions below find a recurrence relation with initial condition(s) satisfied by the sequence. Assume a_0 is the first term of the sequence.

22. $a_n = 2^n$.
 Ans: $a_n = 2a_{n-1}$, $a_0 = 1$.
23. $a_n = 2^n + 1$.
 Ans: $a_n = 2a_{n-1} - 1$, $a_0 = 2$.
24. $a_n = (-1)^n$.
 Ans: $a_n = -a_{n-1}$, $a_0 = 1$.
25. $a_n = 3n - 1$.
 Ans: $a_n = a_{n-1} + 3$, $a_0 = -1$.

26. $a_n = \sqrt{2}$.

28. Suppose inflation continues at three percent annually. (That is, an item that costs \$1.00 now will cost \$1.03 next year.) Let a_n = the value (that is, the purchasing power) of one dollar after n years.

(a) Find a recurrence relation for a_n .

(b) What is the value of \$1.00 after 20 years?

(c) What is the value of \$1.00 after 80 years?

(d) If inflation were to continue at ten percent annually, find the value of \$1.00 after 20 years.

(e) If inflation were to continue at ten percent annually, find the value of \$1.00 after 80 years.

Ans: (a) $a_n = a_{n-1}/1.03$. (b) $a_{20} = 1/1.03^{20} \approx 0.55$. (c) $a_{80} = 1/1.03^{80} \approx 0.09$. (d) $1/1.1^{20} \approx 0.15$. (e) $1/1.1^{80} \approx 0.00$.

$$\alpha = \left(1 + \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}\right)/2 \text{ and } \beta = \left(1 - \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}\right)/2.$$

36. Find the solution of the recurrence relation $a_n = 3a_{n-1}$ with $a_0 = 2$.

Ans: $a_n = 2 \cdot 3^n$
