WORK IN PROGRESS

Books:

The Production of Innovation: a political history of post-industrial America, 1920-2000. The transition of the United States from an industrial to postindustrial economy has had profound political, social, and geographic consequences. This study considers the redefinition of work, workers, production, and productive spaces over the course of the twentieth century, showing the deep roots of the "new" economy and the role of the American state in defining how it grew, where it located, and who participated in it.

Landscapes of Wealth: instant cities, global suburbs, and the environmental future (with Karen C. Seto). The explosive growth of China and India in recent decades has been chiefly an urban story, and the appearance of suburban subdivisions on the outskirts of these new megacities has been much discussed, but little understood. This study blends historical research and analysis of the dynamics of land-use change to show how and why the North American suburb has gone global.
