COMPLETED WORKS

Privacy Rights: Moral and Legal Foundations. What I offer in this manuscript is a definition and justification of individual privacy rights, an account of how these rights should be codified in the law, and an application of the proposed theory to drug testing and public accountability. My hope is to provide a philosophically rigorous defense of privacy rights while addressing numerous important applied issues such as: privacy v. free speech, drug testing, and national security and public accountability. Under contract with Pennsylvania State University Press, forthcoming 2009, 336 pages.

"Privacy, Speech, and the Law." Judicial animus toward protecting privacy especially when free speech issues are present is widespread. In fact across hundreds of cases speech nearly always trumps privacy. I argue that privacy concerns should not be so easily sacrificed in favor of "the public's right to know." The often-noted tension between

privacy and speech in the legal realm is due an expansive view of expression built without foundations – do we actually have a right to know anything falls within the broad domain of “public interest”? After considering numerous cases a method for balancing free speech interests with individual privacy claims is advanced and defended. Under review.

“Drug Testing, Impairment, and Privacy.” In this article several arguments in favor of employee drug testing are considered and dismissed. Much of the analysis centers on the “consent argument” in favor of drug testing and why this argument is unsatisfactory. Under review...requested revisions and re-submission.

“Privacy, Accountability, and the Patriot Act.” In this article I consider a number of issues related to governmental and societal control of information. More specifically, I will focus on the question of when rights to control certain kinds of information may be justifiably overridden in the name of public security. For example, the wiretap laws of 1968 give certain government agencies limited authority to conduct wire surveillance. It is argued that security arguments actually cut the other direction. It is only through the implementation of strong privacy protections that we can obtain an appropriate level of security against industrial espionage, unwarranted invasions into private domains, and information warfare or terrorism. Contemporary Moral Problems, Spring 2008, Spring 2007, Spring 2006, Spring 2005 (UW), Autumn 2000 (two sections) (EMU), Spring 1999 (two sections), Autumn 1998, (CSU), Autumn 1997 (WU), Spring 1997, Winter, Spring, Autumn 1996, Winter 1995 (OSU). This course introduced positions in normative ethical theory, moral epistemology, and metaethics while surveying issues such as euthanasia, abortion, affirmative action, animal rights, the distribution of wealth, pornography and freedom of speech, and computer ethics. As an applied course, special emphasis was given to how abstract moral theories related to concrete everyday moral problems.

Medical Ethics, Winter 2002 (EMU), Spring 1997 (OSU). This course introduced positions in normative ethical theory while surveying issues in medical ethics. Issues that were covered included, abortion, euthanasia, socialized health care, cloning, doctor/patient confidentiality, and genetic enhancement.

Business Ethics, Winter 2003, Fall 2000 (EMU), Spring 1998 (CSCC), Spring 1998 (OSU). This course introduced positions in normative ethical theory while surveying issues in business ethics. Issues that were covered included, affirmative action, sexual harassment in the workplace, employee monitoring v. privacy, employment at will, and the virtues/vices of capitalism.

Ethics and Law in Cyberspace: Privacy, Property, and Power, Spring 1999 (CSU), Spring 1998 (two sections) (MU). Along with a general introduction to ethical theory, topics discussed in this class included crime, abuse, and hacker ethics, ownership of intellectual property and computer software, privacy and encryption in a "wired" world, and network responsibility, liability, and professional codes.

Ethical Theory, Autumn 2002 (EMU), Autumn 1998 (CSU). As an upper level class for majors only this course provided an in depth analysis of the fundamental concepts and problems in moral theory. Examination of various ethical theories included, relativism, egoism, utilitarianism, deontology, virtue ethics, intuitionism, moral skepticism, and nihilism.

Graduate Seminar in the Philosophy of Law: Privacy Rights: Moral foundations and applied issues, Autumn 2007 (UW). This class started with several attempts to define privacy and then turned to the moral and legal foundations of privacy. Along the way several "applied" issues were discussed including: privacy and public accountability; privacy vs. intellectual property and information ownership; government surveillance/Patriot Act; and privacy vs. big media and free speech. Undergraduate versions Summer 2004, 2007.

Justice Matters (Values 512): Autumn 2008. This course introduced graduate and professional students from a wide range of backgrounds to some basic moral questions about social structures and institutions. In particular, most of the discussion centered on various questions about justice, broadly construed as the basic virtue of social institutions.

Philosophy of Law, Autumn 2004 upper level/graduate (UW), Autumn 2002, 2001, 2000 (EMU), Spring 1999 (CSU). This course surveyed a number of issues in the philosophy of law including the nature and function of law, methods of justifying legal systems, the logic of legal reasoning, analysis of fundamental legal concepts, legal positivism and natural law theory, legal paternalism, constitutional privacy, free speech, and theories of punishment.

Political and Social Philosophy, Autumn 2006, Autumn 2003 (UW), Winter 2001 (EMU), Spring 1999 (CSU), Spring 1995 (OSU). This course introduced the political and social philosophy of Hobbes, Locke, Mill, Marx, Nozick, and Rawls. Special attention was given to problems concerning the justification of the state and state coercion, the controversy over the distribution of wealth, and the defense of private property.

Information Ethics: Privacy, Property, and Power, Fall 2008 iSchool Graduate Seminar, Spring 2007, Summer 2006, Autumn 2005, Summer 2005 upper level/graduate (UW). This course centered on several moral problems related to information ownership and control including: intellectual property, file sharing, free speech, privacy, and national security.

Intellectual Foundations of Informatics, Autumn 2007, Autumn 2006, Autumn 2004, Winter 2004, Autumn 2003 (UW). Information as an object of study, including theories, concepts, and principles of information, information seeking, cognitive processing, knowledge representation and restructuring, and their relationships to physical and intellectual access to information. Development of information systems for storage, organization, and retrieval. Experience in the application of theories, concepts, and principles.

Organizational, Societal, and Global Perspectives on Information Systems, Spring 2008, Spring 2006 (UW). Social, ethical, economic, political, and cross-cultural implications of current and future information systems. Information transfer and use within groups, organizations, and cultures. Focus on organizations as information processors, the new knowledge economy, and national and international information policy, intellectual property, privacy, censorship, and freedom of information.

Information Policy: Domestic and Global, Spring 2005 (UW). National and international information policy: public and private sector policy in terms of privacy, access, and exploitation; technology infrastructures and policies supporting the information industries; digital convergence and the emerging mega-industries.

Introduction to Philosophy, Spring 2004 (UW), Winter 2003 (double section), Autumn 2002 (2 sections), Autumn 2001, Winter 2001 (3 sections) (EMU), Autumn 1999 (WSU), Autumn 1998 (2 sections) (CSU Fresno), Spring, Summer 1996, Winter 1998 (Columbus State), Autumn 1995 (2 sections), Winter 1995, Autumn 1994 (OSU). This was a survey course of topics in metaphysics, epistemology, freewill and determinism, philosophy of religion, ethical theory, and political theory.

Introduction to Logic, Online Logic at UW, ongoing summer 2007—present, Winter 2003, Autumn 2002 (online sections), Winter 2002 (2 sections), Spring 2001 (EMU), Winter 1998, Spring 1998, Autumn 1997 (two sections) (CSCC). This course was an introduction to critical thinking and arguments. Topics covered included, inductive logic, categorical logic, propositional logic, language and argument reconstruction, and fallacies.

Philosophy of Social Science, Spring 2000 (WSU). This class introduced students to a number of philosophical problems related to the social sciences.
