## Persuasive Paper Requirements

Consider the "traditional" rules of origami given on page three of Lang's *Origami Design Secrets*: "one sheet of paper, no cuts". After looking at these "rules of origami" you should determine whether these rules should be 'updated' or not.

This paper is a persuasive paper of 350 to 500 words where you take a position on the above topic, offer evidence, and defend your position against attack (refute). This paper does not require any references, although you may find it easier to convince your reader if you include them. It is not appropriate to use colloquial (informal) speech but you may (and should) take into account your personal experiences with origami (and perhaps your work on the origami project).

This paper is to be typed, double-spaced in size 12 Times New Roman or Computer Modern font with one inch margins. Your name and class name should appear on the top left with the title of your paper centered on the next line. If applicable, sources are to be cited using IEEE standards and the references should be listed on a separate page. A sample paper providing IEEE examples and additional links to IEEE resources is posted on the class website and can be browsed to from: (http://faculty.washington.edu/rvanderp/).
