

## Case in Pronouns

Pronouns function like nouns. They are either subjects or objects in sentences. But unlike nouns, they are “case-sensitive, so to speak. You have to use one pronoun when it’s a subject, another when it’s an object. You don’t say, “Me don’t know she.” It has to be “I don’t know her”

Pronouns can be used as objects of verbs as in the sentence above—‘her’ is the object of the very know. They can also be objects of prepositions, as in the sentence: I didn’t want to go with her. ‘Her’ is the object of the preposition ‘with’.

So the way it breaks out is like this:

Person	Nominative		Accusative	
	Singular	Plural	Singular	Plural
First	I	We	Me	Us
Second	You	You	You	You
Third	He, she, it	They	Him, her, it	Them

Who goes with nominative uses and whom goes with accusative.
